

# Young people and justice reinvestment

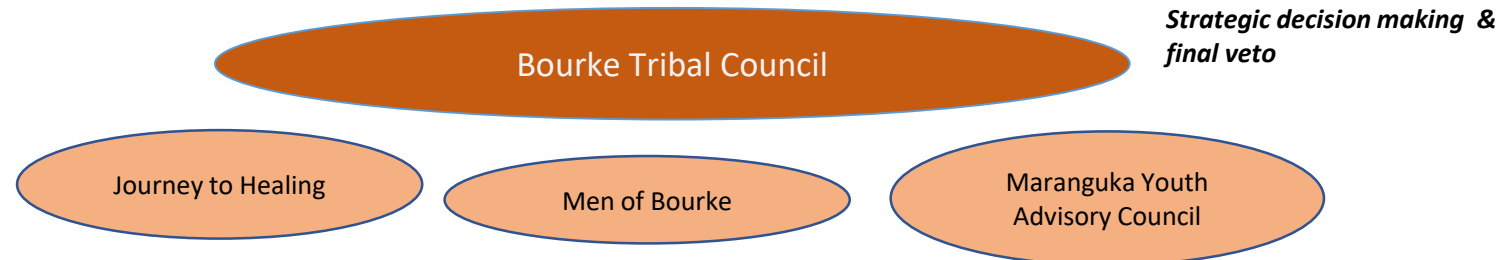
Putting the voices, wishes and concerns of young people front and centre in JR means:

  3. service sector priorities and reforms are determined and lead by the voices and experiences young people & their families in each community
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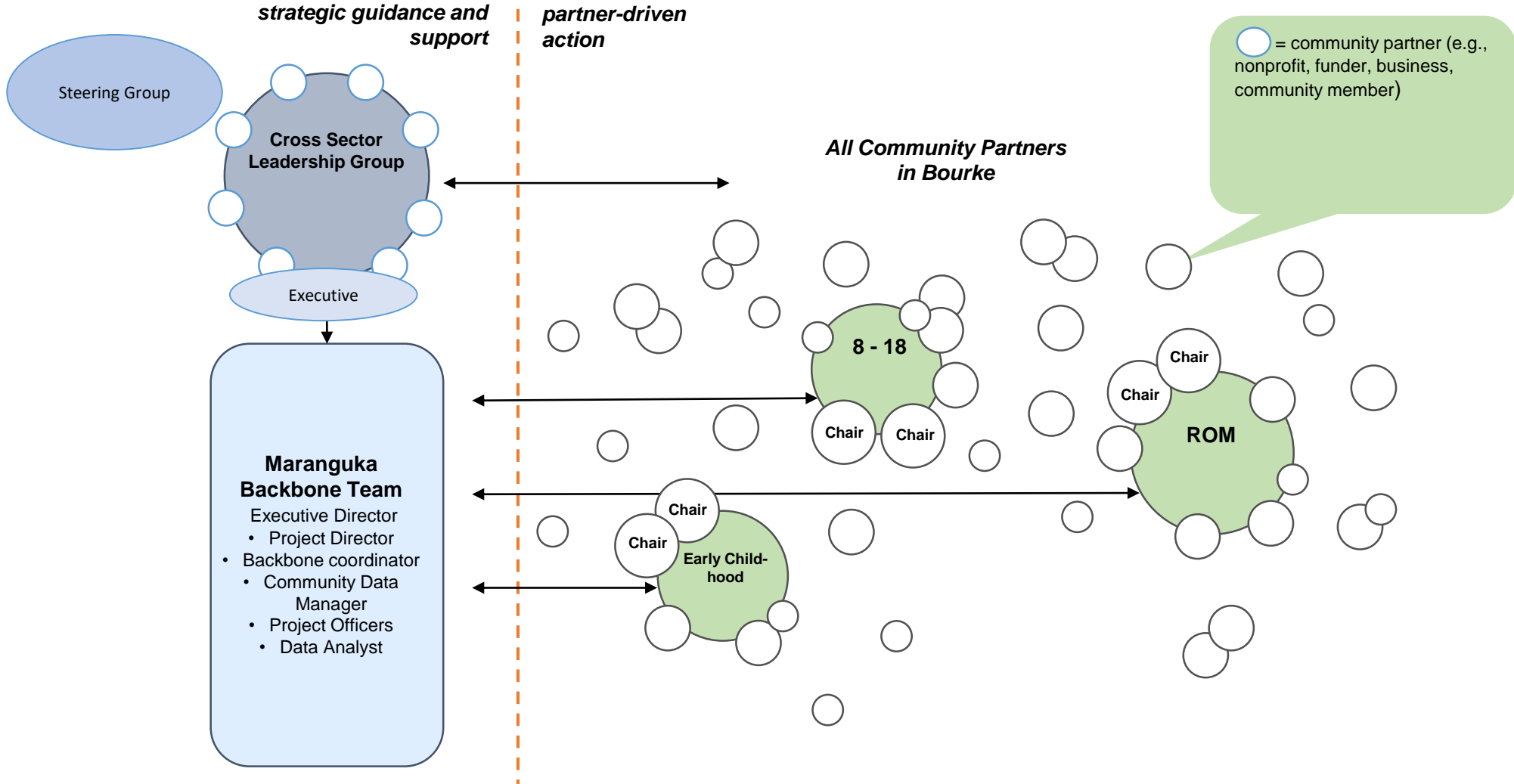

“We’re managing expectations, the reality of how we’ve been treated as Aboriginal people for the last 230 years is there has been a lot of injustice. Justice comes in all shapes and forms and from the littlest things to the big things.

A lot of that’s got to do with our people wanting to be heard and to share their experience, but a step before that is building people’s confidence to get to that point. In a lot of cases our people need to heal and get stuff off their chest and only once that happens then you can sit down and have a strategic conversation.”
